Land Acknowledgement

The 1821 Treaty of Indian Springs, a coerced and largely fraudulent colonial document, ceded Muscogee (Creek) land containing the future site of Atlanta. The Society for the Study of Southern Literature acknowledges the Muscogee peoples who continue to work, create, produce knowledge on, and nurture the land and waters where we are located, as well as the contributions of Muscogee peoples who do this work in diaspora. We acknowledge all of the Indigenous peoples who were affected by the trauma of southeastern Removal, and we recognize the sustained oppression and land dispossession of the Muscogee and Cherokee peoples from present-day Georgia.

We ask now that you consider making a donation as an honor tax to support Muscogee peoples and causes. Over and above acknowledging past wrongs, we ask attendees of SSSL 2022 to take direct action in support of Indigenous futures.






Richard Beale Davis Award

The Davis Award for Distinguished Lifetime Service to Southern Letters honors a writer or scholar who has made distinguished lifetime contributions to southern letters. Dr. Thadious Davis is Geraldine R. Segal Professor Emerita of American Social Thought and Professor Emerita of English at the University of Pennsylvania. Author of four monographs, editor and co-editor of numerous books, and professor of African American and southern literatures, Dr. Davis's prolific contributions to the field of southern studies distinguish her as a lifelong leader in the discipline.



Richard Beale Davis Award

The Davis Award for Distinguished Lifetime Service to Southern Letters honors a writer or scholar who has made distinguished lifetime contributions to southern letters. LeAnne Howe is Eidson Distinguished Professor at the University of Georgia. An award-winning author of novels, poetry collections, plays, documentary films, and an editor of scholarly and creative collections, Howe's body of work illuminates the history and continued presence of Indigenous peoples in what is now the U.S. Southeast.





Pedagogy and Southern Studies

A WORKSHOP



While scholars don't agree on what, where, when, or if "the South" is, we continue to approach problematizing and challenging monolithic conceptions of "the South" in our classrooms. In this workshop, we want to hear about pedagogical choices that have worked as well as ideas-in-progress that seek some collaborative thought. Organizers, Jill Fennell (Georgia Tech) and Allison Harris (UNC Wilmington), will start with short presentations to establish the structure of the forum. Then, you're up!

HERE'S WHAT WE WANT:

This workshop aims to create a generative atmosphere where attendees can interact and share. While we are not asking for prep from attendees, we strive to privilege a sharing of ideas and not a monopolized floor. We'd love to hear ideas about:

- How do you introduce "the South" to your students in a way that problematizes (what may be their expectations of) a monolithic region of Confederate heritage?
- What stories, novels, poems, or other forms of art do you use to get students to start thinking about "the South" in ways that reject the Old South as an unchallenged given?
- What assignments have you constructed that encourage students to investigate the assumed structures that support general assumptions about what southern culture is?

Whether tried-and-true or brand-new, we want to foster discussion that illuminates how scholars across our field teach the (lack of) particularity of "the South." Questions from new teacher-scholars are particularly welcome.




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Directions to GSU's CMII for Tuesday's Closing Night Events

CMII, 25 Park Place NE, Atlanta, GA 30303

This below route is the quickest and most affordable way to access GSU's CMII center. It costs \$5 roundtrip on MARTA public transit and requires approximately ½ mile of walking (~10 walking minutes). Total time from the Hyatt Centric to CMII is approximately 20 minutes.

INSTRUCTIONS

- From the Hyatt Centric, walk west on 10th Street to the Midtown MARTA Station.
 (0.2 mi, 4 mins)
- 2. Purchase a BREEZE CARD from MARTA using the BREEZE Vending Machines at the Midtown Station Entrance. (\$5.00 roundtrip)
- 3. Ride MARTA southbound on either the Red or Gold lines toward Airport Station. (3 stops, 4 minutes)
- 4. Get off at Peachtree Center Station.
- 5. Exit the station through the "Carnegie Way / Forsyth Street" exit.
- 6. Head south out of the exit by crossing Forsyth Street. (<0.1 mi)
- 7. Turn right (south) to walk south on Peachtree Street. (0.1mi, 3 mins)
- 8. Turn left on Auburn Ave NE. (<0.1 mi, 2 mins)
 - GSU's 25 Park Place (a white high rise) will be visible across Woodruff Park by now.
- 9. Turn Right on Park Place NE. (0.1 mi, 3min)
- 10. Arrive at GSU's Creative Media Industries Institute (CMII). It is the lower building with digital displays at the front of GSU's 25 Park Place high rise building.
- 11. Enter through the front door and signs will guide you to the SSSL sessions.





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
